As part of the conference, CLTA-GNY will hold a workshop on Friday, May 4, from 2 to 4 pm in New York City to be conducted by Mr. Thomas Matts, Director of AP World Languages Initiative at The College Board. Mr. Matts is widely quoted in College Board's AP Chinese initiative and is the best authority on AP Chinese. The

following is the description of this presentation: The inaugural administration of the College Board's Advanced Placement (AP) Chinese Language and Culture Examination will occur on May 9, 2007.

The AP Program offers college level courses and exams to motivated high school students in 37 different subjects, including AP Chinese and AP Japanese, both new this year. The vast majority of colleges and universities throughout the United States have policies governing advanced placement or the awarding of college credit for students' successful performance on the standardized AP Exams administered each year. In this timely session, Thomas Matts, Director of the College Board's AP World Languages Initiative, will discuss various aspects of his new exam: its internet-based format, its measurement goals, and its implications for college and university admissions offices and academic departments. Making the Global Connection: Linking Students and China in the 21st Century Conference

NEALRC, collaborating with OSU K-12 Chinese Flagship Program and The Ohio Department of Education, will conduct a joint conference for Ohio educators interested in developing, or expanding Mandarin Chinese language programs in their schools.

The conference was held in Columbus at Hagerty Hall, 1775 College Road, The Ohio State University, on Thursday, December 14, 2006.

Sessions included:

- An overview of the ODE's options for staffing Chinese language programs.
- A presentation by the OSU K-12 project for developing a statewide network of Mandarin programs.
- Information about the ODE's recent Foreign Language Assistance Program (FLAP) grant
