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MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT

Dear CLTA Members,

The 45 year-old CLTA is growing strong! The long list of achievements in the past year, as described in the report by the 06-07 President, Jennifer Liu, would not have been possible without the tremendous effort from the CLTA board, Executive director, Journal editor, Newsletter editor, Webmaster and the impressive leadership of the president. Please join me in thanking this great team.

In addition to looking back and celebrating a wonderful year, we also need to plan ahead and capitalize on the current momentum, ensuring that the CLTA truly "represents Chinese language teachers in all educational settings... supports establishing and sustaining quality Chinese programs, K-16 articulation, teacher education and professional development, and research relating to all aspects of teaching and learning about Chinese languages and cultures... [and] is committed to providing leadership, scholarship, and service to its members and to all sectors of society." (CLTA mission statement).

We have many lofty goals and need the support and sacrifice from everyone. In the coming year, we will strive to

- 1. Enhance collaboration with other national language organizations. In addition to co-sponsoring the CLTA-CLASS forum at the annual conference, we will actively seek collaboration opportunities with ACTFL, CLASS, heritage school organizations, other associations, institutions, agencies regarding articulation, assessment, standard, professional development and rigorous theoretical and empirical research in teaching Chinese as a foreign language. The effort will be headed by the Steering Committee (chaired by the President) and supported by the board and our very enthusiastic members.
- 2. **Establish strong links with regional CLTAs.** For the last several years, we have witnessed the blossoming of regional organizations. It is important that experiences and resources are shared and that efforts are not duplicated. The CLTA will be the facilitating and unifying force that connects all CLTAs in a cohesive and strong network. Claudia Ross, our Regional Chapter Committee Chair, and Cathy Wei, our Regional Chapter Liaison, will be working tirelessly towards this goal.
- 3. Encourage and strengthen research on Chinese language teaching and related studies; provide stronger support and better opportunities for professional development. This requires funding for research and workshops to share knowledge, experiences and results. There have been more awards, thanks to the hard work and continuing commitments from the Awards Committee (headed by Chengzhi Chu) and Jiede Committee (headed by Songnren Cui this past year and Xiaohong Wen in the new year). Jerry Packard expanded the funding resources last year and we have strong confidence that the new chair of the Fundraising Committee, Shengli Feng, will bring the achievement to an even higher level. The CLTA monograph #4 is in the very competent hands of Mike Everson and its successful completion will come soon.
- 4. **Strengthen the presence of the CLTA and make the CLTA more relevant to all its members.** We need to continue to grow and brand CLTA so that our organization can be an effective galvanizing force uniting Chinese language professionals and all those interested in this profession. Members of the CLTA should be able to benefit from the organization uniquely and significantly. The board is already considering measures to increase membership privileges and promote greater communication among members. Theresa Chao, chair

of the Membership-drive Committee, will be working creatively to expand our organization. We look forward to reporting great results next year.

We will continue to strengthen and expand the great tradition of the CLTA so that it can serve all its members more efficiently and provide resources and leadership to the field of Chinese language teaching. We can meet our goals with important contributions from each of you. I look forward to hearing from you and receiving your support!

MESSAGE FROM IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT

The year 2006-2007 continued to witness a "Chinese fervor" both in the United States and all over the world. At this historical juncture, it has been an honor and privilege to be the President of CLTA, the oldest leading professional organization in the field of Chinese teaching and learning, at levels K-16. I am proud to report that thanks to the amazing dedication of the Board and Officers, we have accomplished many ground-breaking and collaborative projects.

Our first effort was to re-assess the state, challenges, and opportunities of our times and revise our strategic plan. This process required months of hard work tirelessly led by Prof. Hong Gang Jin. The result is a well articulated CLTA mission and vision statement. Second, we initiated a new online voting, online membership renewal and update of information, and a new website (CLTA-US.org). All of the enhanced functions have helped to increase our operational efficiency and effectiveness. Third, CLTA expanded our research and professional development offerings through a pre-conference workshop (38 teacher trainers attended), a fruitful collaboration with the STARTALK program at NFLC, a post-conference workshop on Learner-Friendly Grammar for Chinese Instruction, and an empirical research workshop. In addition, CLTA was able to allocate dedicated funding and the Board approved an initiative to create biannual regional workshops starting 2008. Fourth, in our attempts to strengthen K-16 articulation and build coalition among the various Chinese teaching organizations, we offered the 3rd CLTA and CLASS joint forum, initiated the CLTA regional chapter meeting, and co-sponsored a luncheon with National Council of Association of Chinese Language Schools (NCACLS). Finally, recognition should be given to this years fund-raising campaign. As we mature we have decided to establish a new standing committee to support fund-raising. If it is numbers you are interested, it is exciting to note that for the first time in our 45 year history, our membership exceeded 500 and our annual conference included four concurrent sessions, totaling 46 panels and 171 presenters.

None of the achievements occurred overnight or could be realized by a single person; they are the result of months or years of planning, discussion, preparation, implementation, and incredible momentum. So I'm extremely grateful to all my predecessors, particularly the Immediate Past President Mien-hwa Chiang. I'm also indebted to the Program Chair Claudia Ross, Conference Chair, Madeline Spring, Nominating Chair and Vice President Audrey Li, Award Chair Chengzhi Chu, Jiede Chair Songren Cui, Finance Chair Hsin-hsin Liang, Fundraising Chair Jerry Packard, JNCL Representative Shuhan Wang, and all the Board members. Needless to say, my deep gratitude goes to our dedicated officers: Executive Director Cyndy Ning, Journal Editor Neil Kubler, Newsletter Editor Tianwei Xie, and

Web-master Marjorie Chan. Their hard work and active contribution have helped the Board make great strides in many areas.

It is fair to say that together we are paving new ground for Chinese language education here in America. I would like to conclude by thanking all of you, our members, for your trust and support during the year. Through our effort to expand our ability to serve members, build and strengthen the field, define standards for teaching and learning, promote research in language acquisition, linguistic analysis, instructional design, technological advancement, teacher development, and assessment, we are elevating the Chinese teaching profession.

2007 Executive Director's Report

The most momentous event for CLTA this year was that <clta-us.org> was "unveiled" on August 1, and simultaneously CLTA's new on-line payment system was implemented. Since then, about \$8,000 of the approximate \$30,000 in membership income for 2007 has been paid online, via PayPal. This service is particularly welcome to our overseas members, who are thus spared the rather onerous task of having to obtain a US-dollar check to pay their dues. Surprisingly, however, perhaps half of new and renewing members prefer to mail in a check; most of these first update their information online, and then submit a check for their renewal dues. The transition to this system has been relatively smooth, although "de-bugging" is still necessary on a regular basis.

The second most exciting event was that we broke the 500-member mark for the first time in CLTA history. At the time of the ACTFL conference, we had reached 515 members; by the time this newsletter goes out, 2007 membership will be something over 520.

Fundraising Committee Report

The CLTA fundraising committee (Jerry Packard (chair), Songren Cui and Hsin-hsin Liang) drafted and sent fundraising letters to 1) Rosetta Stone, 2) Pimsleur, 3) China Books and Periodicals and 5) Berlitz. The committee also drafted and sent fundraising e-mails to 1) McGraw-Hill Higher Education publishers, 2) Pearson/Prentice Hall, 3) Fluenz, 4) Chinese-Tools.com, and 4) iMandarin. Those efforts yielded positive results from McGraw-Hill, who agreed to underwrite a "McGraw-Hill - CLTA Conference Fellowship" of up to \$2000 to sponsor the attendance of one deserving Chinese language teacher to attend the annual 2008 CLTA conference in Orlando.

In other fundraising events, the first of three installments of \$2,000 paid to CLTA in April of 2007 by Cheng & Tsui Company, the publisher of Integrated Chinese, for

the "The Integrated Chinese Professional Development Fund." Also, CLTA received \$3,000 from ChinaSprout to help broaden CLTA's reach to K-12 Chinese teachers. With the gracious help of Fang Liu of Oberlin College, Mr. Hua Kuoman, and an anonymous professor from Beijing Normal University, an appreciation plaque was pre-

sented to Xiaoning Wang of ChinaSprout at this year's meeting. In addition, the Wenlin Institute donated ten copies of Wenlin to the CLTA

Submitting a proposal for the CLTA 2008 Annual Meeting

The Chinese Language Teachers Association (CLTA) invites proposals for panels or

individual papers to be presented at the 2008 CLTA Annual Meeting, to be held in Orlando, Florida, November 20-23, 2008 in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the

American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL). The ACTFL theme for this year is **Opening Minds to the World Through Languages.** The <u>deadline for submissions is January 11, 2008</u>.

The CLTA Program Committee welcomes submissions on topics relevant to Chinese language, such as pedagogy, materials and program development, acquisition, linguistics, literature, film, media, technology, etc. The CLTA Program Committee will consider panel and in-

dividual paper proposals equally in the selection process. Sessions are 75 minutes long. Each session will be limited to four 15-minute paper presentations, followed by a 15-minute Q&A/discussion period. A formal discussant (optional) will be considered as one of the 15-minute presentations. Panel submissions will be evaluated as panel (session) proposals. Individual paper submissions will be evaluated as paper proposals, and the accepted individual papers will be grouped into panels (sessions) according to theme by the CLTA Program Committee.

Please note that submissions in English or Chinese are welcomed. However, if the submission is in Chinese, the Title and Description must still be entered ONLY IN ENGLISH; the Title and Description MAY NOT BE ENTERED IN CHINESE. If the Title and Description are entered in Chinese, the submission will automatically be rejected.

Multiple submissions are strictly prohibited — only one abstract per individual will be considered, and each individual can participate in only one panel. You must be a member of CLTA to give a presentation at the CLTA Annual Meeting.

Please follow the following instructions to submit a proposal. The entire procedure is on-line, and is done through the ACTFL website. Please note that for both panel and individual proposals, a 500-word summary of your proposal is required. You will be asked to upload that summary as one of the final steps of the submission process. The proposal submission process is as follows:

- → Click on '2008 Call for Proposals'

If you already have a user name and password, Login.

If you do not have a user name and password,

- Create a personal profile by filling in the form fields. You must complete all items preceded by a red asterisk.

When you are done,

- → click on the 'Submit' button. This will take you back to the main menu, where you can **Login**.
- → Click on 'Submit or Edit a Proposal.'
- → Click on 'Submit a New Educational Proposal.'
- → Click on 'Chinese Language Teachers Association (CLTA).'

Your next step depends on whether you are submitting a *Paper Proposal* or a *Panel Proposal*

Please note that the individual presenters in a Panel Proposal must not submit individual Paper Proposals.

It is very important that you keep your personal contact information current since you will receive all notifications via the e-mail address you have provided. Please note that those who apply for the Walton Presentation Prize (for the best first-time presentation at the CLTA Annual Meeting; please see http://clta-us.org/awards/walton-awards.htm) shall submit proposals as *individual papers* only, and must include with their proposal, as their uploaded 500-page document requirement, a summary statement entitled "Walton Presentation Prize Application." Helpful Hints for Submitting a Proposal

- Read the Submission Guidelines and Recommendations when you login. These contain instructions to submitters and also contain helpful hints and tips for submitting your proposal.
- Read the Presenter Responsibilities when you login. It is each presenter's responsibility to understand and follow the directions in this document.
- Review and edit your proposal before submitting online. We suggest you write your proposal and have it in final format, then go to the online submission page where you either copy and paste or retype what you have already written. Please remember that what you submit online is the only thing reviewers have on which to judge your submission; therefore, it's important that you submit a well-written proposal.
- Always, on every page in the submission process, you MUST click "Accept and Continue" at the bottom of the page to save your work and proceed to the next page.
- Proofread your proposal online before you submit. All proposals are to be submitted in final format and only a minimum amount of editing is done to submissions before publishing the information. Make sure what you submit is an accurate reflection of you and your work for colleagues and peers to view.
- Make sure you have entered your e-mail address correctly and have set up your e-mail to accept notices from the submission program as this is the only way communications with presenters will be sent. Presenters are expected to check their "junk mail" file and to have their "spam

- blocker" settings to allow e-mails from DO NOT REPLY@allacademic.com.
- If you do not receive any e-mail correspondence notifying you as to the status of your submission by April 1, 2008, you can login to the Call for Proposals online system to check the "Message Center" for emails sent from CLTA or ACTFL.
- Make sure your personal information is correct.
 As this is a database, any changes in one place will be reflected everywhere and is carried over to the final program guide. If you change jobs or e-mail addresses, you can always login and make these edits to your personal information.
- Create only one (1) login per person.
- Submit early. Typically, 90% of the submissions are entered in the last 24 hours. When this many presenters try to do the same thing, it inevitably slows down the system. Also, by submitting at the last minute you don't have a chance to make changes. As soon as the submission process closes and the Program Committee begins reviewing, submitters cannot edit their submissions.
- Please note that the following size restrictions for fields in the submission process

Title limited to 10 words; Description limited to 50 words; Content limited to 150 words; Method limited to 150 words; Benefit limited to 150 words; Uploaded summary document limited to 500 words.

WALTON PRESENTATION PRIZE

The Walton Presentation Prize (formerly known as the Ron Walton Young Scholar Travel Award), founded by friends and colleagues in 1998, was funded in 2005 by a perpetual endowment from the Cheng & Tsui Company in honor of Ronald Walton's (1943-1996) lifetime dedication to Chinese language education and cross-cultural understanding. This Prize is given to recognize the best first-time presentation at the CLTA Annual Meeting. Preference is given to teachers at the pre-college level and graduate students who have their paper proposals accepted for the annual meeting. The CLTA Walton Presentation Prize carries an award of \$300, and an invitation to submit a manuscript based on the presentation, to be considered for publication in the Journal of the Chinese Language **Teachers** Association.

To apply for the Walton Presentation Prize, a CLTA member shall submit her/his conference proposal (the 500-word abstract) as an *individual paper* only by the January 11, 2008 deadline, and **indicate on the pro**-

posal it is also for "Walton Presentation Prize Application."

If an applicant's proposal is accepted for presentation at the conference, in early April 2008 he/she will be contacted by the Awards Committee for a 3-5 page outline of her/his paper. The outline is due on **June 15, 2008**. The Award Committee reviews all the application outlines, and selects 4 finalists to present at a special panel session of the conference and compete for the Prize. The 4 finalists' names will be announced on July 20, 2008 or earlier. The name(s) of the Prize winner(s) will be announced and Prize(s) presented at the CLTA members' general meeting or banquet in Orlando, FL. The name(s) of winner(s) will also be reported in the January 2009 CLTA Newsletter, and at the CLTA website.

Grant for Chinese Pedagogy/Chinese Applied Linguistics

Call for Proposals

The Chinese Language Teachers Association invites proposals for the Jiede (all-attain) Empirical Research Grant, established in 2003 by an anonymous member, and enhanced thereafter by the original donor and other donors. The grant will support empirical research in Chinese pedagogy and applied linguistics that contributes to building a sound understanding of teaching and learning Chinese as a Foreign Language (CFL). The recipient will be expected to present a paper at the annual meeting of the CLTA or to submit a progress report at the end of the grant term.

Awards: The Jiede Research Grant awards up to \$1,500 to a CLTA current member whose research project exhibits innovation and long-term pedagogical benefit to the field of CFL, but EXCLUDE pure grammatical structural research design. The grant winner must present high quality research that will improve pedagogy in CFL or Chinese applied linguistics. Grant funds may be used for fieldwork, data analysis, or travel, but not for equipment purchases.

Eligibility: Except for university/college tenured associate and full professors, applications from all teaching professions including assistant professors, instructors, lecturers, K-12 teachers, heritage school teachers, inde-

pendent researchers, and graduate students in registered M.A. or Ph.D. programs who are current CLTA members (active membership from grant application to research presentation) and conduct empirical research in the Chinese language are welcome to apply. The recipient should have no other grant support for the same project.

Application: Submit electronically a three to five-page proposal to include a clear description of the research project, such as the theoretical background, the objectives, research design and methods, timeline, and budget of the project (itemize in detail). Please do NOT identify yourself in the proposal. Send with the proposal in a separate attachment a brief (maximum one-page) curriculum vitae, indicating your current status, institutional affiliation (if any), educational background and contact information. Identifying information will be removed prior to forwarding to the committee for anonymous review.

Congratulations to 2007 CLTA Awards Winners:

Vivian Ling, Jiajia Wang, Chunsheng Yang, Yongfang Zhang, and Chunxia Wang

At the CLTA 2007 annual conference in San Antonio, TX, Professor Vivian Ling was selected as the winner of the 2007 CLTA Walton Award for her outstanding lifetime achievement in Chinese teaching. The Awards Committee recognizes Ling as a gifted and extraordinarily dedicated teacher, scholar, and program administrator in the field of Chinese teaching. Ling started her Chinese teaching career in early 1970s. Her teaching skills are recognized as a model to the profession. Ling has been an important mentor of new generations of Chinese teachers in a good few Chinese programs in U. S. and study-abroad programs in Mainland China and Taiwan. Additionally, Ling is the author or co-author of more than a dozen Chinese textbooks, two dictionaries and thirty some articles. She also served as Editor of the JCLTA for four years and maintained its high standards in scholarship.

CHINESE LANGUAGE TEACHERS ASSOCIATION OF TEXAS 2007 YEAR IN REVIEW

The Chinese Language Teachers Association of Texas (CLTA-TX) was established in December 2006 and, since its inception, has had an exciting and eventful year. CLTA-TX is a nonpolitical, nonprofit educational and professional organization created to promote the teaching and learning of the Chinese language in Texas. The mission of the CLTA-TX is to

- enhance quality Chinese language teaching at all education levels
- serve as a resource network for Chinese language teachers
- share ideas and disseminate information
- conduct professional development for Chinese teachers in both language teaching and cultural awareness
- provide a base for common pedagogical improvement and individual career development.

In the first half of 2007, with the effort and commitment of the Board of Directors, CLTA-TX established a website (www.clta-texas.org), wrote and passed bylaws, and applied for 501(c)(3) status. The CLTA-TX Board consists of eleven elected Chinese language educators from

Houston, Dallas, Austin, Georgetown and San Antonio. Currently, CLTA-TX has more than 120 members in K-16 and weekend heritage schools throughout Texas. During 2007, the CLTA-TX Board sponsored a workshop and panel discussion, as well as held its first annual meeting.

WORKSHOP

CLTA-TX organized a workshop Technology for Mandarin Teaching in K-12 on September 13, 2007. at the Language Resource Center, Rice University. The workshop, offered by Dr. Marshall McArthur, University of Houston and Dr. Meng Yeh, Rice University. The focus of the Workshop was on online tools and resources that are useful for teaching Mandarin in K-12 classrooms. The participants gained hands-on computer experience. The handout that contains the links where free software can be downloaded is posted on CLTA-TX website http://www.clta-texas.org/events.asp. The participants found the DimSum free software to be the most useful; it converts traditional/simplified characters and allows to type pinyin (phonetic spelling) with tone markers. Audacity, a download free recording software, is also popular with teachers as it provides unlimited recording time.

PANEL DISCUSSION

Since SBEC approved the use of the ACTFL OPI and WPT as the tests for teacher certification for LCTLs, including Chinese, many Chinese language teachers and K-12 schools are excited about the possibilities of teaching the language and establishing a Chinese program. To present a clear current status and plan for the further development, CLTA-TX organized a panel discussion on Chinese Language Education: Present and Future, October 25, 2007, at Rice University. The audience included K-16 Chinese language educators, Texas school district administrators and local community supporters. The purpose of the panel was to initiate a policy-oriented conversation among these three groups. We invited three panelists to participate in the discussion.

- Maria Trevino, Director of Language Other than English (LOTE), Texas Education Agency, reported on the current status of Texas foreign language curriculum K-12, Chinese teacher certificates and requirements, and proposals made to establish a K-12 Chinese program in Texas.
- Ms. Greta Lundgaard, PlanoISD LOTE Coordinator, presented the successes and challenges of the Chinese programs in PISD. Plano ISD was established in 2004 and awarded a FLAP grant

- in October 2006 to develop the Chinese language program fully.
- Rebecca Sharp, Program Coordinator, Institute for Chinese Language Teaching, Rice University discussed the goals of the Institute for Chinese Language Teaching, funded by a grant from the Freeman Foundation, and the specifics of the Rice program that leads to certification.

Rice University produced a webcast of the discussion which is archived at http://webcast.rice.edu/. The panel has generated enthusiastic and continuing discussion among the members in schools and various communities. CLTA-TX is currently expanding the two-hour panel to a one-day symposium on **Learning and Teaching Chinese in Texas**. The goal for the symposium is to provide more concrete and feasible plans for K-12 schools that are interested in starting a Chinese language program.

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

Cultural Interviews with Chinese- Speaking Professionals

Cultural Interviews with Chinese-Speaking Professionals is a compilation of over 225 brief video clips in which Chinese-speaking professionals discuss cultural issues that are of interest to North Americans. The objective of the interviews is three-fold: First, provide practical cultural information about business topics. The

executives discuss topics such as professional activities, courtesy situations, negotiations North Americans, and stereotypes. The opinions represent those of nearly 60 different people. Second, the interviews provide vocabulary in areas within a professional setting. The interviews present diverse vocabulary within the context of each individual's comments. Third, these materials provide non-native speakers of Chinese with multiple examples of natural speech, illustrating the way that speakers really talk. All of the video clips are transcribed into traditional, simplified, and pinyin Chinese and they are also translated into English.

Cultural Interviews with Chinese-Speaking Professionals was created as a joint project from the Center for International Business Education and Research (CIBER) of the University of Texas at Austin and the University of Hawaii. Professors Orlando R. Kelm and Jeanette Chen (UT) and Professor Haidan Wang (UH) directed and created the online materials. The materials were designed for intermediate and advanced students of Chinese, particularly those who are interested in Business Chinese. However, the materials also serve for students of Chinese who would like to hear samples of natural speech, independent from the cultural and business focus.

MDBG Chinese-English dictionary

The MDBG Chinese-English dictionary is a free

online dictionary aimed at Chinese language learners.

There are two main functions in this website: a word dictionary and a character dictionary. The word dictionary allows you to search Chinese compounds by pinyin, Chinese characters or English definition words. There's a simple yet powerful Google like search syntax with wild card support that also lets you combine different search criteria to narrow down searches. For example: *果 matches all Chinese compounds ending with the 果 character, green cha will match Chinese compounds with green in the English definition and cha as a part of the pinyin pronunciation, thus returning 绿茶 lǜ chá green tea.

From the Chinese compounds in the word dictionary, a student can follow a link to the character dictionary to see detailed information about the individual characters. It is however also possible to get a word decomposition revealing all smaller words of which a large compound consists, for 汉语水平考试 it reveals the sub words 汉语, 水平 and 考试 with their individual definitions.

The character dictionary allows students to learn more about individual characters such as the radical / stroke count, Mandarin and Cantonese pronunciation. Handwriting instructions are available for many characters as well. It's even possible to get additional information such as the Japanese, Korean or Vietnamese pronunciation and on the page number or index where this character is described in various famous books (such as the 漢語大字典). If a student doesn't know both the pronunciation and definition of a character, there's the possibility of hand writing the character or to use a radical / strokes lookup.

Students often have whole sentences or large pieces of text to look up. Perhaps they received an email from a Chinese penpal or a text from their teacher. Show entries for all Chinese words in a sentence in the advanced word dictionary will automatically segment a text into separate words and show the results for each individual word. It can either be formatted to follow the sentence flow of the original text or as a vocabulary list containing all unique words in a text. There's also an annotation tool, which basically does the same thing but shows the details of compounds inline with the original text or in a small popup while hovering over the com-

pounds.

There are also many other handy tools available, such as an online Chinese typing tool allowing you to type Chinese on PCs which do not have a Chinese input method installed. There's even a Chinese input method which shows the English definitions of compounds as you type, ideal for learners who feel unsure about which characters to choose.

Useful for both teachers and students is the *Type* $P\bar{\imath}ny\bar{\imath}n$ tool, which allows you to type those pinyin tone marks easily, the tone marks are placed as you type (i.e. Bei3jing1 turns into $B\acute{e}ij\bar{\imath}ng$).

There are also flashcards and a quiz, to learn new characters and practice what you've already learned.

For those who want to lookup Chinese words onthe-go, there's a mobile version of the dictionary. It can be used on Internet enabled mobiles phones and PDAs.
