The 2009 Chinese Teaching Conference for Confucius Institutes in the US and Canada

Teacher, Teaching material, and Teaching methodologies (3Ts) are currently the three top issues discussed in the field of Chinese teaching and have been emphasized as pivotal in the 3rd Confucius Institute Conference in 2009. Xu Lin, Director General of the Office of Chinese Language Council International (Hanban) has designated that, as part of the trend to fully internationalize the promotion of Chinese teaching, these three issues are imperative. With approval of the Board of the CIPSU the 2009 Chinese Teaching Conference for the Confucius Institutes in the US and Canada will be organized, sponsored and hosted by the Confucius Institute at Portland State University (CI-PSU) on September 18-20 in 2009. The participants include the CI directors, academic directors of Chinese teaching, first-line teachers in the US and Canada, and Chinese language instructors who have been engaging in, or, are interested in non-traditional teaching. Discussions at a deeper level concerning the 3Ts and Chinese curriculum development are expected to be discussed at the Conference. The conference will break down into 8 sessions which cover:
