Union Graduate College Offers MAT in Teaching Chinese

Union Graduate College in Schenectady, New York, offers a master's program that prepares graduates for New York State Initial Teacher Certification to teach Chinese at the secondary level. Launched by the School of Education in 2010, this Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) Chinese Language was one of the first programs of its kind in the United States.

The Union Graduate College MAT in Chinese Language is designed for students who majored in East Asian Studies or Chinese, or are native/heritage speakers. The program combines in-depth study of Chinese culture and language with the study of teaching and learning. It also includes extensive hands-on classroom experience, acquired through a year-long internship during which students teach side-by-side with a mentor teacher.

The program requires 16 courses. Five are in a Chinese subject area and include graduate-level research with Chinese language faculty. The remaining MAT courses are designed to develop reflective teachers who are effective problem solvers, able to connect theory with practice, and skilled in applying a broad range of teaching methods.

Full-time students can complete the program in one calendar year (June - June). Part-time students typically take two to three years.

The Union Graduate College School of Education has earned a reputation for the rigor and quality of its master's programs. It is the first in New York State to be accredited by the national Teacher Education Accreditation Council (TEAC). All Union Graduate College MAT programs are aligned with National Board Certification standards and principles.
